As controversy about a Muslim community center near Ground Zero continues, and as Muslim communities around the United States are experiencing a new wave of backlash, The Interfaith Center of New York has joined New York Neighbors for American Values, a coalition that brings together diverse organizations and communities to stand together for religious freedom, diversity, and equality. ICNY has responded to many queries from media outlets, by giving interviews and assisting journalists to connect with sources including Associated Press, Reuters, and The Christian Science Monitor. Rev. Chloe Breyer has also appeared on Fox News, NBC News, and NY1; we have been mentioned in The New Yorker and Newsweek. In the months ahead, we will continue to advance a message of inclusion and our work to create three-way dialogues between diverse religious communities of New York and religious and secular institutions. - **9-11 WTC MEMORIAL – 9th ANNUAL FLOATING LANTERNS CEREMONY**

Date: Saturday September 11, 2010, 6pm – 9pm

Location: South Side of Pier 40 (W. Houston St. & West Street) Subway: #1 to Houston Street

To commemorate the victims for the 9/11, we will offer interfaith prayers for peace, and prepare a traditional Japanese floating lanterns ceremony to remember the victims. Rev. T.K. Nakagaki of the New York Buddhist Church will lead the ceremony with the assistance of the Interfaith Center of New York and other religious leaders representing many different faiths. This ritual is similar to one held in Hiroshima each year where people gather to float lanterns in remembrance of the victims of the atomic bombings and all victims of war. Special to this year's event will be an exclusive piano and drum performance to remember the 65th Anniversary of the Hiroshima/Nagasaki atomic bombings, and played on the HIBAKU Piano; which survived the atomic bombing in Hiroshima. The event is FREE and members of the public are invited come early to write loved ones' names or a peace message on a lantern.
