Ribbons of Hope Project

Info: "9/11 Ribbons of Hope" is an interactive, community-created art project designed to commemorate the 10th Anniversary of the September 11th attacks by inviting people of all backgrounds, religions, ages and races to tie a ribbon inscribed with a message of hope and healing for New York City.

Just a short walk from Ground Zero, 12 tall mesh panels holding 50,000 ribbons will be installed alongside the Gardens of Remembrance in Battery Park from noon on Friday September 9th until noon on Monday September 12th. All day Friday, Saturday and Sunday New Yorkers and visitors alike are welcome to bring a ribbon and tie it to the panels assisting in the creation of a multi-colored, multi-cultural, tapestry of prayers, wishes, dreams, memories, and celebrations.

We are asking you and your faith communities to help us reach our target of 50,000 ribbons. By logging onto <http://prepareny.ning.com/ribbons>, you can order ribbon kits for your congregations at no charge. These kits consist of individual packages complete with ribbon, permanent marker, instructions and a map to the site of the 9/11 Ribbon of Hope Project. You can also provide your own ribbons, as we welcome all ribbon types and sizes.

Ribbon collection can happen in two ways. Firstly, you and your congregations may want to visit the site to tie the ribbons on at any time from noon on Friday, September 9th until noon on Monday, September 12th. If you can't make it to New York City you can submit your Ribbon of Hope message on the [Groundswell website](#) and they will create a ribbon for you and hang it on the tapestry. NYS Congregations in Solidarity with DREAM'ers

Date: September 16-October 16, 2011

Info: The New York State Interfaith Network for Immigration reform invites New York congregations to join Solidarity with DREAM'ers – a collaboration with the National DREAM Sabbath initiative announced in July by DREAM Act champion Senator Dick Durbin. Participating congregations agree to devote part of a service between September 16 and October 16 to preaching and teaching about the need to protect DREAM'ers from deportation and support the DREAM Act.

The Interfaith Network will send you a DREAM Sabbath Toolkit to assist in preparation of the service, and to provide a DREAM'er to speak at the service if you wish. President Obama's new policy on deportations, announced on August 18th, will save many DREAM'ers already in deportation proceedings from being deported, and we applaud his action. But young undocumented immigrants not in deportation proceedings may not be helped by the new policy – young people who must continue to live in the shadows, ineligible for citizenship and unable to fulfill their dreams and help build the America of tomorrow. The shared values of our diverse faith communities – the values of justice, of compassion, of fair and generous treatment of the

strangers among us – require us to be part of the solution by helping to build support for the DREAM Act.

Your help needed: Host homes, Welcome Kits, Metrocards, etc... for Asylum Seekers

Info: For more than 12 years, Riverside Sojourners volunteers have visited immigration detention centers in the New York City area to befriend asylum seekers -- people who are fleeing persecution in their home countries and are detained simply for asking the United States to protect them. Now the Sojourners -- based at The Riverside Church and with volunteers from several New York universities, community groups and houses of worship -- are helping asylum seekers who have no other friends or family in the U.S. find housing and other support so they can be released from detention, properly document their asylum claim and start to build a new life. To date, Sojourners has helped about 30 people make the transition to freedom and has about a dozen currently in its circle of care. Because it can take months before asylum seekers are authorized to work legally, volunteers help them make connections for free housing, food sources and pocket money, along with referral to English classes, professional and social contacts, and other key resources.

Can you help?
