Located just ten blocks from Ground Zero, Chinatown is the largest residential area affected by 9/11. In the wake of the attacks, routine life in Chinatown halted, with all non-essential traffic prohibited and telephones out of order. Since that time, life near Ground Zero has continued to evolve in tandem with World Trade Center development.

You are invited to join your neighbors on Tuesday, March 27, beginning at 7:00 pm at Mariners' Temple Baptist Church, to share your personal perspective on Chinatown's development.
