Message from ICNY Executive Director

Dear Friends,

This month, we keep in mind those celebrating a new year and those embarking on new beginnings.

September saw the opening of the General Assembly, lots of gridlock traffic, and UN Conference on Migration in New York. At the same time, I had the chance to visit two contrasting refugee camps in and outside Athens, Greece. At one of the government shelters in the old airport of Athens, families had set up tents inside the old arrival and departure lounges and cooked meals outside on the crumbling cement balcony. Children didn't have transportation or the right vaccines to join Greek schools and international NGOs provided food and basic healthcare.

The government camp struck a sharp contrast with <u>#CITYPLAZA</u>, a building for refugees in a self-run converted hotel in a bustling part of the city organized by activists who took over an abandoned hotel and worked with about 200 families to manage the day-to-day functioning of the community. Donations of medicine and food from around Europe stocked the shelves and the children attended local schools. The power of a strong civil society was on display and <u>you can be part of it</u>. Finally, I visited the Sikh Gurdwara of Athens Guru Nanak Darbar that offered food and hospitality to Syrian and Afghan refugees escaping from war in their countries. This effort was part of a wider humanitarian effort of the United Sikhs on behalf of refugees in Europe.



LGBT HISTORY MONTH October Full Month

Marks and celebrates the lives and achievements of lesbian, gay bisexual and transgender

people in the United States.

October NATIONAL DISABILITY EMPLOYMENT AWARENESS MONTH Full Month

Recognizes the contributions of workers with disabilities.

October 1-10 NAVARATRI • Hindu

Nine-day festival celebrating the triumph of good over evil. It worships God in the form of the

universal mother commonly referred to as Durga, Devi or Shakti, and marks the start of fall.

October 2 MUHARRAM • Islamic

The month of Muharram marks the beginning of the Islamic liturgical year. The first day of the month, al-Hijra, remembers the migration of Muhammad and his followers from Mecca to Medina in 622 CE. It also marks the beginning of the ten-day Shi'ite Remembrance of Muharram, a period of intense grief and mourning of the martyrdom of Hussein, the son of

Ali and grandson of Muhammad.

October 3-4 ROSH HASHANAH . Jewish

Beginning of the Jewish New Year and first of the High Holy Days, which marks the

beginning of a ten-day period of penitence and spiritual renewal.

October 10 INDIGENOUS PEOPLE'S DAY (Native American Day)

Celebrates and honors Native American history and culture.

[The second Monday of October is also marked as a U.S. federal holiday, Columbus Day. Many people are opposed to the celebration of a man who led and committed atrocities against Indigenous people. Some states and cities in the U.S. have officially changed the day to Indigenous People's Day. Similarly, it is celebrated as Dia de la Raza, "Day of the

Race*, in Spanish-speaking countries and communities.]

October 11 ASHURA • Islamic

A day of fasting observed on the 10th day of the month of Muharram to celebrate Moses' exodus from Egypt. For Shi'a Muslims, it also marks the climax of the ten-day Remembrance of Muharram, which mourns the martyrdom of Hussein at the Battle of

Kerbala in 680 CE.

October 11 COMING OUT DAY

Encourages honesty and openness about being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender.

Commemorates October 11, 1987, when 500,000 people marched on Washington, DC, for

gay and lesbian equality.

YOM KIPPUR . Jewish October 12

The "Day of Atonement" marks the end of the Ten Days of Penitence that begin with Rosh

Hashanah.

October 14 DASSERA · Hindu

Anniversary of the day when Rama killed the evil demon Ravana. Also known as Durga

Puja, which celebrates the goddess Durga.

INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ERADICATION OF POVERTY October 17

Call to action for the eradication of poverty and destitution worldwide.

October 17–23	SUKKOT • Jewish The week-long "Feast of Booths" commemorates the 40-year wandering of the Israelites in the desert on the way to the Promised Land.	
October 20	BIRTH OF THE BAB • Bahá'í Bahá'í observance of the anniversary of the birth in 1819 of Siyyid, "the Báb," the prophet- herald of the Bahá'í Faith, in Shíráz, Persia.	
October 20	GUR-GADDI GURU GRANTH SAHIB • Sikh Since 1708, Sikhs have accepted Sri Guru Granth Sahib as their eternal Guru that holds the spirit of all Ten Gurus of the Sikhs. They consider Guru Granth Sahib to be a spiritual guide not only for Sikhs but for all of mankind; it plays a central role in guiding the Sikhs' way of life.	
October 24	SHEMINI ATZERET • Jewish "The Eighth (Day) of Assembly" is observed on the day immediately following Sukkot.	
October 24	UNITED NATIONS DAY Commemorates the founding of the world organization in 1945.	
October 25	SIMCHAT TORAH • Jewish "Rejoicing in the Torah" celebrates the conclusion of the public reading of the Pentateuch and its beginning anew.	
October 30	DIWALI • Hindu Also called <i>Deepavali</i> , "Festival of Lights", it celebrates the victory of good over evil, light over darkness, and knowledge over ignorance.	
October 30	BANDI-CHHOR DIWAS • Sikh A commemorative occasion having no fixed date which occurs in October or November and celebrates the release of the Sixth Guru Har Gobind Sahib from imprisonment and coincides with Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights.	
October 31	REFORMATION DAY • Christian Commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation in 1517.	
October 31	HALLOWEEN The eve of All Saints' Day.
