Message from ICNY Executive Director

Dear Friends,

Last Friday's Executive Order introducing a temporary travel ban on people from 7 Muslim countries made an exception for an individual belonging to "a religious minority in [the] country of nationality facing religious persecution." Christians fleeing persecution from Iraq and other conflict-ridden majority Muslim countries would receive entry. Muslims escaping those same places would not. The list of evangelical leaders who have spoken out against this is here. The former Acting Attorney General's Letter refusing to enforce this order is here; and National Security expert Juliette Kayyem puts it succinctly in an interview with Slate "if we want to convince someone that there is a holy war, this is the way to do it. This idea, that Christians are more worthy than the vast majority of other victims who are Muslims, just deepens the problem."

At JFK this weekend, our partner the <u>New York Immigration Coalition</u> described some 52 people (as of Sunday night at 7pm) who suffered under this order:

- A 60-year-old father and 30-year-old brother of a United States Citizen cancer researcher (30 hours)
- A 65-year-old Sudanese woman with diabetes and a Green Card holder
- A father and son from Iran (33 hours)
- A group of six Iraqis, three men and three women were handcuffed and brought from room to room throughout their detention, including through public areas of the airport.


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Rally For Ramarley Graham

Thursday, February 2nd will mark 5 years since Ramarley Graham, an unarmed 18year-old Bronx resident, was killed by the NYPD in his own home in front of his grandmother and 6-year-old brother. Officer Richard Haste and several other NYPD officers busted into the family's home without a warrant, killed Ramarley, and engaged in misconduct and abuses of his family. 

February Full Month BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Celebrates Black History and African American culture in the United States.

February 1 NATIONAL FREEDOM DAY

Commemorates the signing of the 13th Amendment, which abolished slavery in 1865.

February 11 TU B'SHVAT • Jewish

New Year's Day for Trees, and traditionally the first of the year for tithing fruit of trees. Now

a day for environmental awareness and action, such as tree planting.

February 14 VALENTINE'S DAY

Celebrates the idea of romantic love.

February 14 RACE RELATIONS DAY

The National Council of Churches in recognition of the importance of interracial relations

and learning.

February 15 SUSAN B. ANTHONY DAY

Birthday of Susan B. Anthony (1820-1906), a pioneer in the Women's Rights Movement.

February 15 NIRVANA DAY • Buddhist

Celebrates the day when the historical Buddha achieved Parinirvana, or complete Nirvana,

upon the death of his physical body. Sometimes celebrated on February 8.

February 20 PRESIDENTS' DAY

Honors all past presidents of the United States of America.

February 25 MAHA SHIVARATRI • Hindu

Also called Shiva Ratri, it is the Great Festival of Shiva.

February 26-March 1 AYYAM-I-HA OR INTERCALARY DAYS . Bahá'í

The Ayyam-i-ha, or "Days of Ha" are devoted to spiritual preparation for the fast,

celebrating, hospitality, charity and gift giving. They are celebrated the four days, five in leap

year, before the last month of the Bahá'i year,

February 27 CLEAN MONDAY • Eastern Christian

The beginning of Great Lent for Eastern Christian churches, which starts 40 days before

Orthodox Easter (Pascha), counting Sundays.

February 28 SHROVE TUESDAY • Western Christian

A day of penitence as well as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Also known as

Mardi Gras.

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
