Message from ICNY Executive Director

Dear Friends,

On this Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent for Christians, we mourn the death of Srinivas Kuchibhotla — murdered in Olathe, Kansas, by an individual who thought that he had shot "two Middle Eastern men." (Srinivas and Alok Madasani who was wounded are both from India). Muslim Advocates and other community and faith groups are <u>urging an objective and thorough investigation into this killing</u>. We also think of those whose loved ones rest in Jewish cemeteries across the country, and children attending Jewish schools and synagogues that received bomb threats. Thanks to the Administration's misguided Executive Orders, diverse Americans have never been more vulnerable. Last week in New York members of the West African Muslim community were afraid to come from Harlem to a rally at One Police Plaza, <u>Latino residents of Staten Island</u>, were afraid to send their children to school and — hitting closest to home — a long-time ICNY ally and advocate for marginalized New Yorkers for 20 years, <u>Director of the New Sanctuary Movement Ravi Ragbir is facing the prospect of his OWN deportation</u> when he checks in with ICE on March 9th at 26 Federal Plaza.



On April 5th, ICNY will hold a full-day conference for the city's religious and civic leaders, exploring the emerging challenges for religious leadership under the presidency of Donald Trump. How, we will ask, can diverse New Yorkers best respond to the Trump administration's xenophobic rhetoric and policy agenda? What new opportunities for dialogue, collaboration, and community organizing might emerge, as faith leaders mobilize around the rising tides of racism, Islamophobia, and anti-Semitism? How can we advance an inclusive vision for the future of the city and country we love, in what may be a period of sustained attacks on our core values and communities?

Our distinguished keynote speaker will be **Donna Lieberman**, **Esq.**, the Executive Director of the <u>New York Civil Liberties Union</u>. Ms. Lieberman's address will be followed by faith-based responses from **Dr. Debbie Almontaser**, President of the <u>Muslim Community Network</u>, and **Rev. Dr. Peter Heltzel**, Director of the <u>Micah Institute</u> at New York Theological Seminary. Following this keynote panel, additional sessions will explore:

- the role of religious leaders in supporting New York's diverse immigrant communities
- new opportunities for interfaith coalition building, including emerging Muslim-Jewish partnerships
- effective responses to the disturbing rise of hate speech and hate crimes since the election

City of Refuge is a 24-hour mobilization to Stop the Refugee Ban, Save Asylum, and Defend Temporary Protected Status. We are lifting up the stories of refugees and raising up our voices for humanitarian immigration.

The Trump Administration has openly attacked and demonized refugees. The Administration has put forward a freeze on refugee admissions, barred Syrian refugees, and slashed the numbers of refugees admitted for the current year. Trump has ordered a crack down on asylum applications in the US, raising concerns that refugees will be denied due process and returned to countries where they are risk. We are also concerned that the Administration will end Temporary Protected Status programs that protect tens of thousands of immigrants from West Africa, Haiti, Central America, Nepal and other countries experiencing humanitarian crises.

We are calling for an end to the refugee ban, the preservation of asylum and TPS, and truly humanitarian immigration policy. We will organize 24 hours of powerful actions in solidarity with refugees. We are invoking the spirit of the Statue of Liberty and the history of New York as a City of Refuge for immigrants and refugees from around the world.

On Tuesday March 14 at noon, we will rally at 40 Wall Street — The Trump Building. Tuesday at 1 pm, we will march from the Trump Building to the historic Trinity Church, carrying rafts, boats, dinghies, life preservers, and photos and stories of refugees. We will be welcomed to Trinity by Trinity clergy and the interfaith delegation. Throughout the afternoon and evening, Trinity will host teach-ins, cultural events, and action for refugees, as well as an overnight 'tent city.' Tuesday night at 10 pm, we will host a "torchlight vigil" where we will raise the Torch of Liberty together. Wednesday morning at 11 am, we will march to the Federal Building, and gather at Foley Plaza for a closing rally at noon.

Mental Health First Aid is a groundbreaking public education program which introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common treatments. Mental Health First Aid is an 8-hour course, which uses role-playing and simulations to demonstrate how to assess

a mental health crisis; select interventions and provide initial help; and connect persons to professional, peer, social, and self-help care. The program also teaches about the risk factors and warning signs of specific illnesses like anxiety, depression, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, and addictions. Global Refugee Crisis: Time for New Thinking





March	Full Month	NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH Honors women as significant agents of historical change.
March 1		ASH WEDNESDAY • Western Christian The first day of Lent for Western Christian churches, a 40-day period of spiritual preparation for Easter, not counting Sundays.
March 2-		NINETEEN-DAY FAST • Bahá'í
March 20		Baha'is between 15 and 70 years of age do not eat or drink from sunrise to sunset and set aside time for prayer and meditation.
March 8		INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY Celebration of the economic, political and social achievements of women worldwide.
March 12		MAGHA PUJA • Buddhist Also known as Sangha Day, it commemorates the spontaneous assembly of 1,250 arahants, completely enlightened monks, in the historical Buddha's presence.
March 12		PURIM • Jewish
		The "Feast of Lots" marks the salvation of the Jews of ancient Persia from extermination.
March 13		HOLLA MOHALLA • Sikh An annual event which is a martial arts parade historically coinciding with Holi, the Hindu festival of colors. Celebrations related to Holla Mohalla may be held in various locations over several weekends preceding the actual date of the holiday.
March 13		HOLI • Hindu Also called Holaka or Phagwa, this festival celebrates spring and commemorates various events in Hindu mythology.
March 17		ST. PATRICK'S DAY • Christian Feast day of the patron saint of Ireland. In the U.S., a secular version is celebrated by people of all faiths through appreciation of all things Irish.
March 20		VERNAL EQUINOX The date when night and day are nearly the same length. It marks the first day of the season of spring.
March 21		INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF RACIAL DISCRIMINATION Call to action to eliminate all forms of racial discrimination worldwide.
March 21		NOWRÚZ • Zoroastrian A traditional ancient Iranian festival celebrating the first day of Spring and the Iranian New Year. Also celebrated as New Year's Day in Baha'i tradition (Naw-Ruz).
March 31		CESAR CHAVEZ DAY Honors Mexican American farm worker, labor leader and activist Cesar Chavez (1927–1993) who was a nationally respected voice for social justice.

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
