Dear Friends,

This month in NYC, you can be part of an historic action during the first two weeks of October, to get hundreds of women and teenagers out of prison on Riker's Island. Mass Bail Out at the RFK Foundation will pay bail for hundreds of women and children who are currently incarcerated on Rikers Island. To make this happen, they are seeking volunteers. Each Mass Bail Out Volunteer will take one shift, on one day, during which they will commute to a New York City jail, armed with a check provided by Mass Bail Out and all the information required to bail out two of their fellow New Yorkers. To become a Mass Bail Out Volunteer, sign up for one of our Volunteer Trainings.

An Interfaith Prayer Vigil at the Westchester County Jail

The successful reentry into society of individuals from incarceration should be everyone's issue to ensure we are building safe, healthy, and inclusive communities that are nonjudgmental and nonbiased in decision-making and resource allocation. Individuals with previous justice involvement should not be ostracized or feared by their community but, instead, should be embraced and loved. The Interfaith Prayer Vigil is an opportunity for the faith community to show others how to stand side by side through prayer and solidarity. It is also an opportunity to reach back within a neighborhood to lend support to family left behind and to provide a space for redemption for those who want to come home and become their best self.

Mass Bail Out



Everyday thousands of people languish in jail simply because they are too poor to make bail. Even a few days in jail can ruin a person's life. They may lose their job, their family may lose housing and some may even lose custody of their children.

Robert F. Kennedy Human Rights is spearheading a Mass Bail Out action to end wealth-based incarceration. The Mass Bail Out is designed to free 400 women and 50 teens awaiting trial at Rikers Island jail. The Mass Bail Out will demonstrate the truth of our inalienable human right: No one should be held in jail simply because they cannot afford the ransom on their freedom.

The Mass Bail out will begin next week (October 1) and run for 2 weeks and volunteers are needed to post bail. Each volunteer must attend a training and be available for a minimum of 3 hours for a bailout process. Learn more about volunteering here.

New Sanctuary Coalition Jericho Walk around Cayuga Center



Please join us next Tuesday October 2nd at 11am for a special Jericho Walk around Cayuga Center.

Although the Trump Administration said they ended their policy of separating families apprehended at the southern border on June 20th, 2018, thousands of children had already been taken from their parents and sent to holding facilities around the country - often thousands of miles from where their parents were detained. Many were taken to Cayuga Center in New York City. There are still children there, separated from their families for months.





October 8 INDIGENOUS PEOPLE'S DAY (Native American Day)

Celebrates and honors Native American history and culture.

[The second Monday of October is also marked as a U.S. federal holiday, Columbus Day. Many people are opposed to the celebration of a man who led and committed atrocities against Indigenous people. Some states and cities in the U.S. have officially changed the day to Indigenous People's Day. Similarly, it is celebrated as Dia de la Raza, "Day of the

Race", in Spanish-speaking countries and communities.]

NAVARATRI · Hindu

Nine-day festival celebrating the triumph of good over evil. It worships God in the form of the

universal mother commonly referred to as Durga, Devi or Shakti, and marks the start of fall.

October 11 COMING OUT DAY

Encourages honesty and openness about being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender. Commemorates October 11, 1987, when 500,000 people marched on Washington, DC, for

gay and lesbian equality.

October 17 INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ERADICATION OF POVERTY

Call to action for the eradication of poverty and destitution worldwide.

October 19 DASSERA • Hindu

Anniversary of the day when Rama killed the evil demon Ravana. Also known as Durga

Puja, which celebrates the goddess Durga.

October 20 BIRTH OF THE BAB • Bahá'í

Bahá'í observance of the anniversary of the birth in 1819 of Siyyid, "the Báb," the prophet-

herald of the Bahá'í Faith, in Shíráz, Persia.

October 20 GUR-GADDI GURU GRANTH SAHIB • Sikh

Since 1708, Sikhs have accepted Sri Guru Granth Sahib as their eternal Guru that holds the spirit of all Ten Gurus of the Sikhs. They consider Guru Granth Sahib to be a spiritual guide

not only for Sikhs but for all of mankind; it plays a central role in guiding the Sikhs' way of life.

October 24 UNITED NATIONS DAY

Commemorates the founding of the world organization in 1945.

October 31 REFORMATION DAY • Christian

Commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation in 1517.

October 31 HALLOWEEN
