Dear Friends,

I recently asked a Harlem-based Imam and partner of the **Interfaith Center of New York** (ICNY) about the effects of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raids on the thousands of West African Muslims who attend prayers at his mosque.

The Imam's response shocked me.

Some members of his mosque are so afraid of ICE that they have stopped seeking medical care at New York City Hospitals in order to avoid the risk of exposing their identities regardless of their legal status.

That is why ICNY took action.

For New York City's religiously diverse immigrant communities, the threat of deportation is all too real, and it is damaging the health and safety of our city.

Together with State Sen. Brian A. Benjamin, the New Sanctuary Coalition, and Union Theological Seminary, **ICNY** worked quickly to create a network of diverse houses of worship willing to be trained and easily identified as places of respite and welcome in the event of additional ICE raids.
