Democracy is a practice that needs to be exercised on a regular basis. Whatever your faith tradition, you can exercise that fundamental right by voting in the midterm elections, taking place

next Tuesday, November 8. Learn about where to vote and how to vote early by <u>clicking</u> here.

When voting, please be aware that there are important referendums on the back of the ballot, including some questions from the Racial Justice Commission. Learn more at our event tomorrow, November 3rd: What's on your Ballot and click here to pledge to flip over your ballot in the NYC 2022 General Election. (When you make your pledge, please make sure you let them know that the Interfaith Center of New York sent you).

On October 31, 2022 26-year-old Gilberto Garcia became the latest fatality and eighteenth person to die on Rikers Island *just this year*. Approximately two people a month are dying on Rikers, which is why ICNY continues to host rallies and vigils to draw attention to this critical issue prioritized by faith leaders in our 2021 Racial and Economic Justice Compact. Join us for some part of the 18 hours of action in honor of 18 lives taken in New York City Jails this year, taking place tomorrow at City Hall Thursday, November 3rd from 8 AM until midnight.

There will be a 7pm interfaith vigil commemorating the lives lost in DOC custody, and organizers have expressed a need for clergy participation. If you wish to participate or sign up for a specific timeslot, you can RSVP here. Clergy are especially needed from 6 to 8 pm. This event is organized by the Jails Action Coalition, #HALTsolitary Campaign, Freedom Agenda, VOCAL-NY, and Visionary V.

Later in the month, on Nov. 19 from 1-3 PM ET, I hope you will join Circles of Support for kNOw Justice Here with activists, family members, academics, faith leaders, and elected officials discussing the painful impact of gun violence. Speakers will include Rashon Johnson, Destini Phillipot, Pastor Gil Monrose, Dr. Jamein P. Cunningham, Oresa Napper-Williams, Apostle Staci Ramos, Estelle Skrykers-Santiago. More details are below.

Day of Action: End NYC's Death Penalty

Please join family members of people killed by NYC jails, survivors of Rikers, and allied organizations at City Hall Park on Thursday, November 3rd for 18 hours of action in honor of the 18 lives taken by New York City jails this year. As the humanitarian crisis of Rikers continues, this event will be calling on Mayor Adams and other officials to release people from city jails, stop sending people to these deadly jails, and protect the human rights of all New Yorkers.

Throughout the day there will be commemoration of the lives lost at Rikers and The Boat, holding speak outs, doing outreach, and incorporating art and performance. Some of the main events during the day will be:

- 7pm vigil in honor of lives taken by NYC jails
- 11:30pm closing ceremony

Commemorating Kristallnacht: When History Interrupts Our Lives: Kristallnacht, 84 Years Later

Victoria Barnett will reflect on what happens when history so dramatically interrupts human lives—and what this means for our own obligations to the victims of history today.





As many of you know, <u>New York City has received over 12,000 asylum seekers</u> in the past two months from Texas. While the majority are Latinx from Central America, many are our Muslim brothers and sisters from West Africa. The asylum seekers are randomly dropped off at Port Authority without essential needs like shoes, hygiene products and etc.

Muslim Community Network has launched an <u>Amazon wishlist</u> to secure essential items for these migrants and asylum seekers to ease the transition process. The wishlist includes essentials such as winter coats, undergarments, toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, body wash, shoes, prayer mats, blankets, and more.
