Dear Friend,

ICNY and our current cohort of ICLA fellows were recently invited to attend an ecumenical service at the newly restored **St. Nicholas Orthodox Church** during the Week of Prayer for

Christian Unity (see above photo). Located on the World Trade Center Site and having been destroyed on 9/11, the modern themes in the new shrine's sacred paintings include firefighters, police, and the twin towers under the care Mary, Mother of God. As we enter **World Interfaith Harmony Week** (see programs below) and prepare for **World Hijab Day** today, February 1, we remember how far we have come as a city regarding interfaith relations and respect for religious diversity.

Meanwhile across NYC, the lack of affordable housing was highlighted this week when more than [50 migrant men demonstrated against a city transfer from the Watson hotel to a congregate and temporary facility in Brooklyn](#). They have refused to leave the Watson Hotel—where they have work and community—and ask to remain versus being sent to the Brooklyn Cruise Terminal. The migrant men, many from South America and West Africa, seek dignified housing and the right to work. Supporters are also asking for an end of the 90 day waiting period for housing vouchers, and a release in rent stabilized spaces. The plight of these men and their actions reflect another facet of the housing crisis in NYC.

Next, be sure to sign on to the [Housing 4 Justice Faith Leader Sign On Letter](#) that recommends reforming the voucher system and supporting more social housing.

This week, ICNY sent a letter to Mayor Eric Adams that was signed by 80 plus faith leaders representing New York City's diverse religious landscape. The letter calls for the Mayor's "clear and unwavering" commitment to reduce incarceration, close Rikers Island, and open borough-based jail facilities by 2027 as per legislation passed by the City Council in 2019. 



The Young Center - Volunteer Child Advocate Training

Training Dates: Saturday Feb. 11 & Sunday Feb. 12 Trainings held at NYU School of Law (40 Washington Square S, New York, NY 10012)

The Young Center New York office will be hosting a Volunteer Child Advocate training on February 11 & 12, 2023, for those who are interested in supporting unaccompanied or separated immigrant children. The Young Center for Immigrant Children's Rights is a non-profit organization whose mission is to advocate for the rights of unaccompanied immigrant children. The Young Center provides Volunteer Child Advocates (akin to guardians ad litem) for trafficking victims and other vulnerable immigrant children. These advocates are adults who volunteer to spend time with, and advocate on behalf of, an individual unaccompanied immigrant child while he or she is in federal custody and subject to immigration proceedings. Currently, the NY office needs bilingual volunteers who are available to conduct in person weekly visits for one hour as a Child Advocate at a facility in New York.

Volunteer requirements:

- Must be 21+ years of age.
- Must be fluent or highly proficient in Spanish, Mam, K'iche', Kekchi, or Chuj.
- Must be able to travel to at least one of the facilities served by the Young Center in Westchester County, Harlem, and the Bronx.
- Must attend a two-day in person training in February 2023.
- Must be able to clear a federal and state background check.
- Must provide proof of a negative tuberculosis test within the past 12 months and a COVID vaccination card to enter a detention facility.
- Must provide COVID19 vaccination card.
- Must be willing to commit approximately one hour per week to visit with an unaccompanied child.
