Dear Friend,

In the coming weeks, we find the confluence of Ramadan, Passover, Easter, and the Sikh celebration of Vaisakhi. Further down in this email you will find links to iftars, seders, and other celebrations that are open to all New Yorkers, including the Muslim Sisters of Staten Island Community Iftar, the Seder in the Streets for Housing Justice, the Queens Borough President's Vaisakhi Celebration, and much more. We hope you will take this opportunity to share in your

neighbors' sacred calendars. For those observing Passover, you can also enrich your own family's holiday by downloading the <u>HIAS Haggadah</u>, which weaves the stories of today's refugees and asylum seekers into the Passover seder, and by downloading <u>Adamah's</u> sustainable Passover Resources.

In our local NYC sacred calendar, it is important to note that this Tuesday, April 4, marks the anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr's powerful speech <u>Beyond Vietnam: A Time to Break Silence</u>, delivered at Riverside Church in Morningside Heights on April 4, 1967. Dr. King's call to action speaks to us in our own time of crisis: "Now let us rededicate ourselves to the long and bitter—but beautiful—struggle for a new world."

Doing our small part in this struggle, ICNY recently joined <u>over 100 diverse faith leaders in calling on Governor Hochul to support Good Cause Eviction and other policies for housing justice</u>. You can do your part by reaching out to elected officials in Albany. Also see below for an invitation to join in a <u>multifaith solidarity fast to support migrant hunger strikers</u> calling for more humane conditions at two privately-run detention facilities.

Last but not least, ICNY joins our Roman Catholic neighbors—and all people of good will—in offering prayers for Pope Francis's speedy recovery from bronchitis. Wishing His Holiness a springtime of good health and personal renewal.

NYC NEEDS YOUR HOUSE OF WORSHIP TO HELP SHELTER ASYLEES

A Proposed New Program will pay Congregations to Shelter & Feed up to 19 Asylees per Night

Since last summer, over **44,000 Asylum Seekers** have arrived on their own or been transported to New York City without regard for their wellbeing. Hundreds of asylum seekers continue to arrive each week. The NYC shelter system, hotels and alternative housing sites have been overwhelmed as asylum seekers try to find safe shelter while awaiting immigration court proceedings. While most are single men, single women and families with children are also arriving. Many of these fellow global citizens in crisis have fled unimaginable conditions in their country of origin and then experienced an arduous journey on their way to New York City.

Many arriving asylees have been traumatized by violence, robbery, sexual assault, and trafficking. They are also eager to start new lives. NYC government agencies, nonprofits and grassroots advocates have sought to create spaces and services that offer safe housing, compassionate care, immigration resources and the dignity of being treated with respect and with cultural and religious competence.

The city has been providing hotels, homeless shelters, and other mass care spaces as housing on a temporary basis. We are proposing to fund congregations, of any faith tradition, to provide temporary small group shelter housing to single adult male and female asylees. The program would provide shelter for the next 12-24 months while all of us continue to call on the state and Federal government to help address this need for more permanent housing.

We are seeking houses of worship that:

- · Are located near subway or bus lines.
- Have a 900+ Square Feet space to sleep 19 asylees from approximately 7PM to 7AM 24/7/365.
- Have space for 19 asylees to be served and sit to eat meals.
- · Will hire or have a security guard.
- · Will hire or have a volunteer Shelter Coordinator.
- Will provide all guests with a hot dinner and a hot or cold breakfast.
- Provide access to bathrooms and showers (shower installation grants are being considered in the absence of onsite showers).
- Training/Technical Support as well as Cots/Bedding/Towels & Storage Trunks will be provided.
- Adhere to key NYC building and fire safety code requirements.

In exchange for your hospitality, congregations will be paid a monthly fee – to cover all required operating expenses related to meeting each asylees' basic human needs and to offset space use costs



Summer Certificate Program in Spiritually Informed Psychotherapies

June 14 through July 26, Online

The <u>Psychotherapy and Spirituality Institute's</u> summertime continuing clinical education certificate program in Spiritually Informed Psychotherapies gives qualified professionals providing mental health or pastoral care services an opportunity to holistically inform their practices through

the study of the key intersections between spiritual wisdom and psychological insight.

In a *virtual* seminar setting, students will consider a wide array of topics – including intimacy, family life, LGBTQIA+ issues, cultural diversity, addictions, conflict, grief, and trauma – incorporating spiritual perspectives into each area. A brief final integrative reflection paper will allow students to apply what they have learned to their own work.

This program is meant to enrich professionals' clinical practice and deepen their understanding of how spiritual dynamics figure in holistic care. **18-CECs are available to NYSED certified LMSWs, LCSWs, LMFTs, LCATs,** and **LMHCs.** Graduates of the summer certificate program will become PSI alumni and program affiliates.

Multi Faith Solidarity Fast to End Immigration Detention

April 2 - 8, on a Day of Your Choosing

The <u>Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity</u> invites people of all faiths or none to fast on one day of their choosing from April 2-8, 2023, to support hunger strikers protesting the dehumanizing and unjust conditions of immigrant detention.

Over the past month, 84 people who are currently detained at Mesa Verde (Bakersfield, CA) and Golden State Annex (McFarland, CA) joined a hunger strike calling for immediate release and closure of the facilities. Since the strike began, at least 7 leaders have been violently removed by ICE officers and transferred to El Paso, TX for forced feeding. While the hunger strikers are traumatized from the attack, they are resolved in forging ahead. They are calling on the outside community to stand in solidarity with them, and to help elevate their demands to elected and ICE officials.

As a multifaith community we are hosting a week of fasting. Many faith traditions have a practice of fasting as a way to deepen our spiritual focus, intentions, and practice. Politically, fasting is a key strategy of nonviolent resistance to obtain political goals and disrupt the status quo. Together we will show the people who are detained that THEY ARE NOT ALONE!

This community teach-in event will center community care and education, and how we can push back against this current attack on reproductive rights and ensure sexual and reproductive healthcare access for all. Due to a baseless lawsuit filed by anti-abortion actors, a drug called Mifepristone that is used in most medication abortions might be pulled off the market. These attacks are strictly politically motivated - Mifepristone is safe and effective, and has been used by more than five million people since the FDA approved it over 20 years ago.
